## The Academy needs a budget that reflects our values



The layoffs proposed in this budget cut programs that serve California school teachers, visitors of all ages, and young students who will be the scientists and nature champions of the future. These programs are integral to the Academy's reputation as a beacon of science learning to funding organizations and to the general public.

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## **NOT ADMINISTRATION**

- Programs that serve the public are on the chopping block
- Executive pay, bonuses, and new HR positions are being protected
- Executive pay now makes up to 10% of the Academy's labor budget. From 2007-2015, it was 5-6%.
- HR positions have represented nearly 44% of the cost of new positions posted from August 2022 to February 2023.

These cuts would both create instability and drastically reduce our scope of work. How will this impact the ability of Development and Govt Affairs to generate funding under those conditions?
